

Electronic Journal of Psychology and Public Politics - REPSIPP: a collective project

Resilience... A lot of is needed so as to produce and spread science.

In November of 2007, after we established that Brazil still did not have a specific publication whose mission was to divulge content that portrayed the existing interface between Public Politics and Psychology, we decided to create a virtual journal to be published every six months, edited by the Regional Council of Psychology 09/Goiás and Tocantins (CRP-09), that allowed the plural approach of such content and that, at the same time, met the pre-requisiteness of the QUALIS/CAPES and allowed the creation, in the site of CRP-09, of a link destined to the interlocution between the respective editors, authors and readers.

Ever since, all that we have done is to invest in the possibilities of dialogue between two contexts historically marked by tensions, vague stances and adversities, the Brazilian public sector and Psychology. Our objective was always to bring together efforts to allow us to bring to the public this first edition of the Electronic Journal of Psychology and Public Politics, an edition that brings together nine articles signed by 18 different authors that act in nine different institutions, located in four Brazilian States.

Different speeches, including the ones not produced in the extent of the public section are found together in this first edition of REPSIPP, synthesis of the plurality of the thought checked by the revision of pairs and by the observance of technical criteria for indexation effect. And it really could not have been any different. REPSIPP intends to be a reference for the foundation of the feeling of belonging of the psychologist linked to the public sector and, in a certain level, also for that professional's identifying constitution in this same sector, above all in what refers to the planning and the execution of public politics.

Specifically, the nine articles published in this edition of REPSIPP compose an interesting mosaic that portrays their authors' effort in understanding the articulation possibilities between Psychology and public politics in terms of scientific communication, education, health, social assistance, the worker's health, old age, the prison system, social-educational measures and sexual diversity.



The fact that all these subjects of such recognizable importance are gathered here denotes the sensibility and the rigidity with which they were selected and appraised by the members of the Scientific Editorial Board of the REPSIPP, to which we addressed our gratitude. Hopefully, together, we can transform REPSIPP into a reference source for the research and for the construction of the plurality in the field of technical and scientific production.
